MASCOT & COLOR

"CRUSADERS" - The name "Crusader" was first associated with Holy Cross in 1884 at an alumni banquet in Boston, where an engraved Crusader mounted on an armored horse appeared at the head of the menu. The name was rediscovered by Stanley Woodward, a sports reporter for the Boston Herald, when he used the term "Crusader" to describe the Holy Cross baseball team in a story written in 1925. The name appealed to the Holy Cross student body, which held a vote later in that year to decide whether this cognomen or one of the other two currently in use - "Chiefs" and "Sagamores"- would be adopted. The Tomahawk of Oct. 6, 1925, reported that the results of the ballot were: Crusaders 143, Chiefs 17, Sagamores 7.

PURPLE - The official color for the College of the Holy Cross is purple, which comes from the motto "In Hoc Signo Vinces" on the purple labarum (military standard) of King Constantine the Great (born about 275 A.D., died in 337 A.D.)

Meg Galligan 22nd Season

Meg Galligan, the winningest coach in the history of Holy Cross field hockey, is in her 22nd year as head coach. Galligan, who inherited a Division I program in its infancy in 1985, has transformed the Holy Cross program into a perennial winner.


The three-time Patriot League Coach of the Year (1992, 1997 & 2000) has guided Holy Cross to six appearances in the Patriot League Championship game in the past nine years, while capturing three Patriot League Tournament Championships and two Patriot League regular season titles. In addition, Galligan's teams have been ranked nationally in scoring offense in four of the last six seasons and winning percentage in three of the last six seasons. Further, she has posted a 52-31 cumulative record against Patriot League competition over the last 15 seasons.

Galligan coached her ninth-consecutive Patriot League Tournament team in 2005, posting a 3-2 mark in conference play during the regular season. The third-seeded Crusaders defeated Bucknell in the Patriot League Tournament semifinal game, but fell to defending champion and nationally-ranked, American, in the tournament championship game. The 2004 squad also went 3-2 in conference play, earning the third seed in the tournament, but came up short against Colgate in the semifinal game. In 2003, Galligan's second-seeded Crusaders were defeated by top-seeded American, 1-0, in the Patriot League championship game.

In 2001 and 2002, Galligan led the Crusaders to consecutive Patriot League regular season titles. In 2000, her team captured the program's first regular season title with a perfect 6-0 record and third tournament title in four years. During the 1997, 1998 and 2000 seasons, her teams advanced to NCAA Play-In games. In 1998, Galligan led her squad to its second-consecutive Patriot League Tournament title, while posting the most wins (16 wins) in school history. In addition, her team finished the season with a national RPI ranking of 18 out of 73 teams.

In 1993, Galligan guided her team to a 12-6-1 mark earning a spot in the ECAC Tournament. During her 21-year tenure at Holy Cross, Galligan has compiled an overall record of 186-204-10.

Galligan also served as head coach of the Holy Cross women's lacrosse team for 10 years (1986-95). She was honored as the 1992 Patriot





League Lacrosse Coach of the Year after guiding the Crusaders to an 8-5 record, the program's most successful finish in over a decade. Following the completion of the 1995 lacrosse season, she gave up the reins to devote her full attention to the field hockey program.

Galligan began her coaching career at Georgetown in 1981 where she compiled a 15-7-2 mark over two seasons. She then assumed the position of head field hockey and lacrosse coach at Babson College for two seasons (1983-85).

A 1978 graduate of Boston College, Galligan enjoyed a highly successful collegiate career. In addition to setting several scoring records for the Eagles, she earned Most Valuable Player honors as a senior captain, and was selected to the Northeast and National Festival Tournaments.

Galligan has served on the NFHCA Ethics Committee and has been a staff member with the Olympic Development Program for 12 years while serving as a head coach for six years. Since the fall of 2000, she has been a member of the Northeast Regional Committee and the All-American Committee. Galligan is also the chairperson of the Patriot League field hockey coaches committee and served as an ECAC field hockey committee member from 1995-98. In 1988 and 2004, she directed trips to Europe where the Holy Cross team competed against international competition. Galligan was inducted into the Newton Country Day School of the Sacred Heart Athletics Hall of Fame in 2004. It was school's first ever hall of fame induction.

Galligan and her husband Peter reside in Needham, Mass. with their 10-year old daughter Cori.



Alicia Roberts Hawk Second Season Holy Cross '99

Ali Roberts Hawk is in her second full season as assistant field hockey coach at Holy Cross.

A member of the Patriot League Field Hockey All-Decade Team, Hawk graduated from Holy Cross in 1999 and was a four-year letterwinner with the Crusaders. She currently stands as one of only five players in Holy Cross field hockey history to total 100 points or more.

In 1998, Hawk served as team captain and was named both the Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year and the Patriot League Scholar-Athlete of the Year. She still stands as the only Holy Cross field hockey player in program history to be named as the Patriot League Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

A two-time regional All-American and two-time All-Patriot League selection, Hawk earned Patriot League Tournament Most Valuable Player honors as a senior and finished the season ranked in the Top 10 nationally in goals scored.


Hawk led the Patriot League in scoring in both 1997 and 1998, while helping the Crusaders to back-to-back Patriot League Tournament titles and back-to-back NCAA Tournament Play-In games.

Following her senior season, Hawk was selected as the team Most Valuable Player, named to the Division I North/South Senior All-Star Team, and awarded the Holy Cross Norton Prize.

Hawk is currently tied for the program record for goals in a single season (19 goals in 1998), and is ranked second in program history for points in a single season (42 points in 1998). Hawk had held the record for points in a single season for almost 10 years before Tara Welch '07 recorded 46 points just last season.

In addition, Hawk is ranked fourth in program history for assists in a single season (10 assists in 1997), is tied for fourth in program history for career goals (40 career goals) and career assists (20 career assists), and is ranked fifth in program history for career points (100 points).

Originally from Argentina, Hawk earned a degree in



History with a concentration in Latin American Studies from Holy Cross in 1999. In 2002, she earned a master's degree in Latin American and Caribbean Studies from Indiana University, where she also served as team manager for the field hockey team.

Hawk and her husband Kent reside in Rutland, Mass., with their son, Jonas, who was born in May.



As a senior, Hawk led the Crusaders to their second straight Patriot League Tournament Championship (left) and a program-record 16 wins in 1998.

With 12 letterwinners and eight starters returning from last year, including four of the top five scorers on the team, the 2006 Holy Cross Crusaders are full of talent and full of hope of winning the program's fourth Patriot League title in the last 10 years.

Holy Cross steadily improved throughout 2005 and visibly gained momentum as the year went on. Towards the end of the season, the team started to show signs of a championship-caliber squad, after putting together a great performance against nationally-ranked Boston College, fighting back for a come-from-behind win over Dartmouth, and taking nationally-ranked American to overtime.

All of that culminated into an appearance in the 2005 Patriot League Tournament championship game, which was the program's sixth title game appearance in the last nine years. Despite falling to American in the title game, Holy Cross had a lot of positives to take from the season. Seven different players recorded goals, eight different players recorded assists, and all but one of those point-getters are returning in 2006.

"The team is excited for the upcoming season," said head coach Meg Galligan. "I observed a dramatic transformation with the squad during the offseason. Every player took her game to another level, and as a unit, the team feels more confident and capable of achieving even greater success in 2006."

With excellent team dynamics, a solid core of veteran players, and seven newcomers expected to offer immediate depth to an already talented squad, look for Holy Cross to make a run for the 2006 Patriot League championship.

FORWARDS


The 2006 Crusaders will be led by All-Region and two-time All-Patriot League selection, **Tara Welch**. Arguably the most prolific scorer in program history, Welch has been one of the top two scorers in the Patriot League the last two seasons and finished 2005 ranked nationally in three different categories.

Welch, who will serve as a tri-captain this season, enters the year nine goals away from setting a new program record for career goals and 20 points away from setting a new program record for career points. She is currently tied for eighth on the all-time Patriot League goals list.

"Tara is a fearless competitor who has a solid understanding of the game," said Galligan. "Her quick hands and great elimination skills make her a dynamic frontline leader."

Joining Welch at the forward position is junior **Sara O'Coin**. O'Coin, who started all 20 games last season and totaled 17 points on five goals and seven assists, will be looking to step up





this season after the graduation of **Jenna Cook '06**, one of the best finishers in program history. According to Galligan, O'Coin has emerged on the scene as a dangerous forward, and has meshed well with Welch, making the duo a pair to watch out for in 2006.

"Sara's stick skills have caught up with her tremendous speed and she improved on transitioning the ball into scoring range, while getting some creative touches on the ball this Spring."

Junior **Katie Rowlenson** started all 20 games in the midfield in 2005, but has added striker skills to her repertoire and is showing signs of becoming a frontline threat this season.

"Katie is very quick and agile," explained Galligan. "This Spring she was passing well, drawing corners and using her defensive skills to be a pest against opposing backs. Her rise in confidence has led to a more assertive approach to her game, and she will continue to help us in the midfield as well."

Sophomore **Kristin Schulz** saw a lot of action last Fall, and is expected to be a legitimate scoring threat this season. "Kristin has natural instincts with a lot of potential. With experience under her belt this season, we will look for her to be able to string more plays together up front."

Incoming freshmen **Nora Happny** and **Katie Talbert** are both talented forwards and will also add depth in the Crusader frontline this season.

MIDFIELDERS AND BACKS

Senior tri-captain **Laura Cohen** added a pro-active style to her defensive play last year and became an impact player for the Crusaders in the midfield. A First Team All-Patriot League selection last season, Cohen started all 20 games and was third on the team in scoring with 31 points on 13 goals and five assists.

"Laura is a smart player and uses her composure to her advantage," said Galligan. "She is one of the best at seeing long passing lanes and makes effective use of her solid, deceptive hit in those instances."

Along with Cohen, senior tri-captain **Susie Whelan** will bring great leadership to the team and make up the backbone of the Crusaders' defensive unit.

Last season, Whelan was named to the All-Patriot League Second Team after leading the team in both interceptions and tackles, and totaling 13 assists on the offensive end, which was secondbest on the team.

"Susie has a tremendous work ethic and positive spirit that will come in handy as one of our 2006 captains," said Galligan. "She is a fluid, aggressive, all-around player and her versatility will

allow us to put her wherever we need to make a difference in a game."

Junior **Lauren Coletta** will also be returning to the starting line-up this season. The versatile Coletta started all 20 games last year, finished the season tied for second on the team with 79 interceptions, and contributed in the scoring column from her defensive position.

"Lauren has endless energy with solid marking skills," said Galligan. "Her ability to concentrate on the task at hand is an asset to our game, and her offensive mindedness when she takes possession of the ball is an added bonus."

Carolyn Connelly embraced the role of the team's '12th Man' last season, but will be vying for a starting job this year. "'CC' is a low, very focused player with deceptive snap passes. She gained more confidence in her overall game this Spring, and I anticipate seeing her step up her role on the team this Fall."

The Crusader backfield is also returning junior starters **Kim Powell** and **Eli Skovron**, whose game experience will offer Holy Cross a more veteran defensive unit in 2006.

"Kim is a solid defender with an intimidating presence on the field. She creates dynamic plays, and her powerful hit will be advantageous for clearing balls upfield."

"Eli is a deceptively smart defender. She can often trap her opponent unknowingly and take possession of the ball with her sound tackling skills. She has a great deal of poise and can help keep our squad calm under pressure."

Sophomores Jessie Cullen and Liz Morris have made significant progress in the offseason and will seek more playing time this Fall, while newcomers Katie Aylward, Kaitlyn Barnes, Courtney Callahan and Brit Sachs are expected to contribute to the team's depth.

GOALKEEPERS

Starting in the cage this season will be sophomore **Erin Singleton**. Singleton saw limited playing time in 2005, after spending the season backing-up two-year starter and two-time All-Patriot League selection, **Sony Kuhn**. Singleton did show signs of things to come, however, as she earned her first career win and shutout in her lone



start of the season at Brown on Oct. 26. "Erin has a great deal of talent and handles pressure very well," said Galligan. "Her performance last Fall and during the off-season is a glimpse of a successful career ahead."

Newcomer **Kelly Casey** was a standout high school player and brings a wealth of experience at the national and international level. "Both Erin and Kelly have great character and poise, and will no doubt help our program succeed."

The Patriot League's athletic success is achieved while its member institutions remain committed to its founding principle of admitting and graduating student-athletes that are academically representative of their class. Participation in athletics at Patriot League institutions is viewed as an important component of a well-rounded education.

In its second decade of combining academic and athletic excellence, the Patriot League sponsors championships in 23 men and women's sports. Initially started as an NCAA Division I-AA football conference in 1986, the Patriot League became an all-sport conference in 1990 and includes American, Army, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh and Navy as full members, and Fordham and Georgetown as associate members. These institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation and their alumni have, and continue to play leadership roles in shaping our country.

Since 1998, the Patriot League has ranked first each year among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid in the NCAA Graduation Rate Report. In addition, the Patriot League finished first in the new NCAA Academic Progress Report (APR) among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid (combining with all eight of its full-time member institutions for an average of 984 out of 1,000). The APR is used to measure academic eligibility, retention and graduation of student-athletes.

Patriot League student-athletes and teams continue to enjoy success at the national level, with opening round victories coming in several NCAA Championships, including consecutive wins in men's basketball, a final four appearance in men's lacrosse and a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Cross Country Championship.

The Patriot League's mission is simple, to provide successful competitive athletic experiences while maintaining high academic standards, and to prepare its student-athletes to be leaders in society.



PATRIOT LEAGUE SUCCESS

The Holy Cross Field Hockey program has established itself as one of the top programs in the East in the last decade. In the last nine years, Holy Cross has made the Patriot League tournament every year - including six title game appearances, captured three Patriot League championships (1997, 1998, 2000), earned three appearances to the NCAA Play-in game, and won two Patriot League regular season titles

In the last nine seasons, head coach Meg Galligan has compiled a 39-14-0 record against Patriot League competition. Her 1997 team was awarded the 'Team Award of Excellence' by the

Holy Cross finished the season ranked in the Top 20 nationally for scoring defense in four of the past six years.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts Governor's Committee on Physical Fitness, while her 1998 team compiled the most wins in school history (16 wins), which ranked

18th nationally. In 2000, Galligan was named the Patriot League Coach of the Year for the third time in her career.

HISTORICAL SUCCESS

Under the direction of Galligan, the Holy Cross field hockey team has created a tradition of unparalleled success. Holy Cross has appeared in the Patriot League tournament 11 times in the last 12 years, and won Patriot League tournament championships in 1997, 1998 and 2000.

In the past 13 seasons, Holy Cross has compiled a 143-111-2 mark with the program's most successful run coming during the 1997-01 stretch where a 61-39 record was highlighted by five Patriot League tournament appearances, three Patriot League tournament

Holy Cross placed in the Top 20 nationally for both margin of victory and winning percentage in three of the last six years. titles, three NCAA Play-In games, and two Patriot League regular season titles. That five-year span marked the most successful period in the history of the program.

The 1993 campaign laid the groundwork for future accomplishments. For the first time in 10 seasons of Division

I competition, Holy Cross posted its best record to date at 12-7-1 and gained a berth in the prestigious ECAC Division I Tournament.

The 1994 campaign was equally as impressive. The skilled Crusader defense yielded only 16 goals in 20 games en route to a second-consecutive winning (12-7-1) record. Holy Cross also established a school record by shutting out nine opponents. The highlight of the season was a 2-1 upset of Patriot League rival, Lafayette, which assured the Crusaders of a berth in the inaugural Patriot League Tournament.

In 1995, the Crusaders made their second-consecutive league tournament appearance after finishing tied for second in conference play. After a rebuilding year in 1996, the 1997 and 1998 teams responded with back-to-back league championships. The 1997 squad began the season with five-consecutive victories and earned the number two seed in the Patriot League tournament with a 4-2 league mark. By defeating Lafayette, 2-1, in the championship game Holy Cross captured its first-ever league crown and earned the right to host the NCAA Play-In game. Despite a loss to Ball State in the Play-In game, the Crusaders bounced back in 1998 and won nine of their first 11 games, including a streak of seven consecutive wins, which stands as a school-record. By season's end, Holy Cross had captured its second-consecutive Patriot League title and earned a trip to the NCAA Play-In.

After a rebuilding year in 1999, the Crusaders claimed their third Patriot League title and first-ever regular season title with a perfect 6-0 record in 2000. Holy Cross finished its impressive season ranked second in the nation in team defense and 11th in both winning percentage and margin of victory, having received Top-20 votes throughout the season. The Crusaders started the 2001 season



by winning nine of their first 10 games en route to their second-consecutive regular season title. Holy Cross tied for fourth in the nation in team defense, ranked 14th in margin of victory and tied for 18th in winning percentage in 2001. At one point during the season, the Crusaders were ranked 20th nationally.

In 2002, Holy Cross rallied from a 1-4 start to the season to finish 10-10 overall, highlighted by a 3-1 upset victory over nationally ranked (#19) Syracuse on the Hart Turf Field. The Crusaders then made their second consecutive appearance in the Patriot League championship game in 2003 with a 13-7 record which included an impressive five-game winning streak and 5-1 record in the conference. In 2004, Holy Cross won 11 games and clinched the third-seed in the Patriot League tournament with a 3-2 conference record, before falling to eventual runner-up Colgate in the semifinals.

Last season, the Crusaders got off to a slow 1-4 start, but bounced back to win 10 games, and again earned the third seed in the Patriot League tournament with a 3-2 mark in league play. Holy

Cross upset secondseeded Bucknell, 3-1, in the tournament semifinals, but fell to #5 American, 4-2, in the championship game. Just two weeks earlier, Holy Cross took the nationally-ranked Eagles to overtime.

Holy Cross has had 18 players selected to the Patriot League academic honor roll and 14 players selected to the Division I National Academic honor roll the last two years.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

As impressively as Holy Cross' student-athletes have performed on the field, their accomplishments in the classroom may be even more impressive. **Ali Roberts '99** was named the 1998 Patriot League Field Hockey Scholar-Athlete of the Year, while 35 Holy Cross players - 20 of them multiple honorees - have been selected to the national academic squad over the last 12 years. In addition, Holy Cross student-athletes have annually earned places on the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll by earning a varsity letter and a 3.2 grade-point average, including an astounding 17 players during the 1996 season. Holy Cross alumns Kati Griffith, Sarah Cox, Julie Silva, Meg Barry, Jillian LeClair, Heather Yanusas, Cat Kerman and Sony Kuhn are the only four-time honorees. In addition, LeClair, Kuhn and Christina Zorzi are the program's only players to have earned spots on the national academic honor roll each of their four seasons.

REV. MICHAEL C. McFARLAND, S.J., PRESIDENT

On July 1, 2000, Rev. Michael C. McFarland, S.J. became the $31^{\rm st}$ president of the College of the Holy Cross.


Founded in 1843, Holy Cross is the oldest Catholic college in New England. Barron's Profiles of American Colleges ranks the College in a select group of the nation's 50 "most competitive" institutions of higher learning. Among America's top liberal arts colleges, Holy Cross is the only one that embraces a Catholic, Jesuit identity.

Prior to becoming president, Fr. McFarland was the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Gonzaga University in Spokane, Washington. He was at Gonzaga for four years, where he was also a professor of computer science.

Fr. McFarland taught at Boston College from 1986 to 1996. As associate professor of computer science he created new courses in ethics and computers, computer architecture and digital systems. He created a laboratory for digital electronics and developed tutorial materials for a course on computers in management. He served as department chair for three years during his tenure at BC.

Born in Boston in 1948, Fr. McFarland lived for a time in California and later graduated from Xavier High School (now closed) in Concord, Mass. He completed his bachelor's degree in physics at Cornell University in 1969.

He earned a master's degree and Ph.D. in electrical engineering



(computer engineering) at Carnegie Mellon University. He worked as a consultant from 1985-86 at the AT&T Bell Laboratories, doing research in computer-aided design of digital systems. He continued his research at Bell Laboratories while he was teaching at Boston College.

Fr. McFarland has published articles in the Proceedings of the IEEE (the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers), the IEEE Transactions on Computers, the IEEE Transactions on Computer-Aided Design of Integrated Circuits and Systems, Formal Methods for System Design, the Journal of Systems and Software, Computer, and Technology and Society. He was an associate editor of the IEEE Transactions on Computer-Aided Design of Integrated Circuits and Systems for three years and has been on numerous program committees for conferences such as the Design Automation Conference, the International Conference on Computer Design, the International Conference on Computer-Aided Design and the High-Level Synthesis Workshop.

Fr. McFarland joined the Jesuits in 1975. He studied at the Weston School of Theology in Cambridge, Mass., and earned a master's in divinity and Th.M. in social ethics. He was ordained in the St. Joseph Memorial Chapel at Holy Cross in 1984.

Fr. McFarland enjoys running in his free time and is a loyal Crusader athletics fan.

RICHARD M. REGAN, Jr., '76 DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Richard M. Regan, Jr., is now in his ninth year as the director of athletics at Holy Cross. Regan, whose tenure began on July 1, 1998, became just the fourth Holy Cross athletic director in the last 50 years.

Regan's first eight years have been productive ones for the Crusaders. During this period of time, 15 Holy Cross teams have advanced to NCAA tournament play — including at least one team in each of his eight seasons. The women's basketball team has been to the postseason in seven of the last nine years (six NCAA appearances and a WNIT berth in 2002), while the men's ice hockey (2004)

and 2006), field hockey (1998 and 2000) and women's soccer (2000) programs have also made NCAA appearances. Regan's tenure has also seen the first-ever NCAA appearances for the women's lacrosse (2006) and men's soccer (2002) teams. In 1999, Regan hired Ralph Willard as the men's basketball coach, a move which revitalized the program. The Crusaders have advanced to postseason play in four of the last six years, and become the first Patriot League team ever to advance to the NCAA tournament in three consecutive seasons (2001, 2002 and 2003).

Success is not measured only by wins and losses, but by other gains

as well. In an effort to further increase the number of Crusader teams coached by full-time staff members, Regan announced the appointment of full-time coaching positions in track, volleyball, women's lacrosse and softball. Gender equity has been a major focus of Regan's administration and he introduced the college's first two new varsity sports in more than 15 years — women's ice hockey and women's golf.

Improvements to the athletics facilities have also been part of Regan's focus. The new Linda Johnson Smith Stadium is home to not only the men's and women's soccer teams, but its unique two-sided stands and press facilities provide an additional benefit to home events for field hockey, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse and outdoor track and field.

The baseball team opened new on-campus stadium beginning in the fall of 2005. And there have been improvements to other facilities as well, such as the softball field, the men's ice hockey locker room, and a new video room for the men's and women's basketball teams.

In addition to his duties on campus, Regan has become involved in college athletic policy on a national scale. From 1999-2004, he served a four-year term as a Division I-AA representative on the NCAA Division I Management Council. The Management Council, comprised of 49 athletic administrators and faculty athletic representatives from around the nation, reports directly to the NCAA's Division I Board of Directors. The council is responsible for adopting operating bylaws and rules to govern Division I, interpreting Division I bylaws, reviewing recommendations from the Division I conferences and universities, and developing and implementing the Division I budget.

Prior to returning to Worcester July of 1998, Regan worked for NFL International and NFL Europe (formerly the World League of American Football). He joined the New York office of the World League in 1991 and was based in London beginning in 1992. Over the next several years he lived in London and Edinburgh, and served as managing director of the Scottish Claymores, vice president of European operations and chief operating officer.

When the World League went through a reorganization following the 1992 season, National Football League commissioner Paul Tagliabue appointed Regan as managing director of NFL International, Ltd., to oversee and develop the NFL's business interests throughout Europe. In that role, he was instrumental in establishing NFL International in Europe and planning and executing the NFL's American Bowl series of international games in London, Dublin, Barcelona and Berlin.

Regan held the post of managing director of Monarch International, Inc., a licensing and financial consulting firm, for three years before joining the World League.

After graduating from Holy Cross in 1976, Regan spent nine years working for Arthur Andersen & Company in its Boston, Mass., offices, rising to the level of senior manager. He then moved to the NFL with the New England Patriots, where he served in the role of Vice President of Finance from 1985-1988

His ties to Mount St. James run deep, as he is the third generation of his family to attend Holy Cross. He is the son of Richard M. Regan (Class of 1950), and the grandson of Harold J. Regan (Class of 1917). Regan's sisters, Mary (Class of 1977) and Ann (Class of 1980), also graduated from Holy Cross. His daughter, Deidre, graduated from Holy Cross in 2006.

Born in Providence, R.I., Regan and his wife, Judi, have three daughters — Jennifer, Deirdre and Colleen.

Opened in 1997, the Carol and Park B. Smith Wellness Center is a two-story facility which was built as an addition to the Hart Recreation Center. The Wellness Center provides state-of-the-art fitness equipment for varsity athletes and all other members of the Holy Cross community.


A \$1.5 million gift from Carol and Park B. Smith '54 kicked off the campaign to fund the facility. "Everyone today agrees that fitness is very important," Smith said. "I'm confident that this Wellness center - whose facilities will be second-to-none - will provide a real benefit to current and future Holy Cross students, teachers and staff."

With 15,000 square feet, the Wellness Center provides over four times more space than the College previously had for varsity and community exercise and training, and centralizes athletic equipment and facilities once found in five locations in three campus buildings.



On the first level, the center houses a highly versatile strength and conditioning center for Holy Cross' 650 student-athletes. There are areas for speed development programs, as well as for strength and endurance conditioning. The space, which is able to accommodate as many as 60 people at a time, enables Holy Cross' larger sports teams to work out together, thereby enhancing team unity.

The second floor has been designed for use by all students, faculty and staff. It has two sections: one for aerobic training, and the other for cardiovascular, variable-resistance and strength training. A diverse selection of equipment accommodates users ranging from beginners to advanced athletes. Its south facing wall is mostly glass, allowing most users a view of the practice fields and the rolling hills of central New England.





JEFF OLIVER Strength & Conditioning Coach

Jeff Oliver enters his 11th season as strength & conditioning coach. Oliver spent two seasons at Boston University as an assistant strength and conditioning coach and served as the strength and conditioning coordinator for the Worcester IceCats, the former AHL affilliate of the St. Louis Blues organization.

Oliver graduated from Boston College in 1988 with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration and was selected to receive the Thomas Scanlon Memorial award for Scholarship, Leadership and Community Service. His playing career did not end with Eagles, however, as Oliver went on to play for the New York Jets from 1989-90, and finished his career as an offensive lineman for the Barcelona Dragons of the World Football League.

He earned his Masters in Education from Boston University in 1996 and is also a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist.

Oliver and his wife Kate have four children; Peter, Corinne, Claudia, and Keating. They reside in Worcester.

The center also offers programs that explore the connections between fitness and wellness, and help students learn how good health can compliment and enhance other aspects of their educational experience.

An advisory board comprising physicians, fitness and strength trainers, faculty members, psychologists, nutritionists, a College chaplain, and others are responsible for creating and coordinating programming for the Center.

With 6,500 square feet of the Center devoted solely to varsity athletes, a much greater number of athletes can be accommodated at one time, and teams can train together at times more convenient to their busy schedules as student-athletes.

The state-of-the-art equipment in the Wellness Center includes eight multi-purpose power racks, each with over 600 pounds of free weights; seven Olympic lifting platforms with over 375 pounds of rubberized free weights, more than 3000 pounds of dumbbells, 18 pieces of aerobic equipment, three full sets of plyometric boxes amd a number of free weight-loaded pieces of equipment to accommodate injured athletes.



CORRESPONDENCE

It is important for prospective student-athletes to get in touch with head coach Meg Galligan as soon as possible. A simple letter of inquiry into the field hockey program will initiate the recruiting process. The spring of your junior year or early senior year is the most appropriate time to contact coach.

INTERVIEWS

Students are strongly encouraged to have admissions interviews. The office offers interviews from the summer **until January 15**. Alumni interviews in most metropolitan areas are available. Students must first submit an application and indicate they would like an alumni interview before **December 15**.

EARLY DECISION

Students who are absolutely, 100% confident Holy Cross is their top college choice are encouraged to apply during the Early Decision process.

FINANCIAL AID

All financial aid is awarded on the basis of need. Prospective student-athletes should complete the CSS "Profile Form" in early Fall.

CLEARINGHOUSE

The NCAA mandates that all student-athletes interested in competing at the Division I or II level must be certified through the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse. Contact high school coaches, athletics director or guidance counselor for necessary registration forms.

TELEPHONE CALLS

As per NCAA by law 13.1.3.1, institutional staff members may not telephone a prospect (or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians) prior to July 1 following the prospect's completion of the junior year in high school. After July 1, institutional staff members may telephone a prospect once per week (measured Sunday through Saturday). The once-per-week limit applies to the entire institution.

CALENDAR:

A typical recruiting calendar for a prospective student-athlete interested in field hockey would go something like this:

- ** **Spring/Summer of 2006** -- make unofficial visits to schools of interest and contact Head Coach Meg Galligan if Holy Cross falls within your top-five list of potential colleges.
- ** **Summer of 2006** -- Head Coach Meg Galligan will be in contact regarding student-athlete's interest and possible visit date.
- ** December 15 -- Deadline for Admissions Early Decision.
- ** January 15 -- Deadline for Admissions Regular Decision.

APPLICATION DEADLINES:

December 15 - Early Decision

December 15 - Last day to request alumni interview (application needs to be postmarked by this date)

January 15 - Regular Decision

January 15 - last day for on-campus interviews

VIDEO TAPES

In an attempt to make an accurate assessment as soon as possible, it is recommended that videotapes be forwarded to head coach Meg Galligan's attention as soon as possible. The video need not be an elaborate production. Some simple game or practice tape is sufficient with you being easily identified.

CONTACTS

As per NCAA by law 13.02.3, a contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parent or legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletics representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. Any such face-to-face encounter that is prearranged or takes place on the grounds of the prospect's high school, or at the site of organized competition or practice involving the prospect's high school, preparatory school, two-year college, or all-star team is considered a contact, regardless of the conversation that occurs. We are limited to three off-campus contacts per prospective student-athlete.

EVALUATIONS

As per NCAA by law 13.02.6.1, an evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to assess the academic qualifications or athletic ability of a prospect, including any visit to a prospect's educational institution (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of a prospect participating in any practice or competition at any size. We are limited in our number of evaluations per prospective student-athlete.

OFFICIAL VISITS

According to NCAA by law 13.7.1.2, a prospect may not make more than five expense-paid visits to NCAA member institutions, regardless of the number of sports in which the prospect is involved. An institution may not provide an expense-paid visit to a prospect who has not presented the institution with a high school (or college) academic transcript and a score from a PSAT, an SAT, a PACTPlus, or an ACT test taken on a national testing date under national testing conditions.

UNOFFICIAL VISITS

According to NCAA by law 13.8.1, a prospect may visit an institution's campus at the prospect's own expense an unlimited number of times and may make an unofficial visit before the prospect's senior year in high school.


Holy Cross is renowned for its academic excellence and mentoring-based, liberal arts education in the Jesuit tradition. An exclusively undergraduate institution with just over 2,700 students, Holy Cross is the oldest Catholic college in New England. Founded in 1843 in Worcester, Mass., the campus occupies 174 beautifully landscaped acres, featuring traditional and contemporary architecture, state-of-the-art facilities, and striking views from atop Mount St. James.

Academic life at Holy Cross is serious, challenging and exciting. Student-professor exchanges in the classroom, as well as in countless informal settings, are at the center of academic life at Holy Cross. With a student to faculty ratio of 11 to one, the opportunity for individual attention is readily available. Few classes exceed an enrollment of 40, and most average 19 students.

Holy Cross professors are widely respected in their academic specialties. Many have national reputations for their research and publications, creative performances, recordings and exhibitions. Almost all of the nearly 300 full- and part-time faculty members hold doctoral degrees from some of the finest universities here and abroad.

Among the major academic facilities on campus are Dinand Library (which, along with three other specialized libraries on campus, has total holdings of more than 650,000 volumes); Iris and B. Gerald Cantor Art Gallery (with a regular schedule of world-class exhibitions); Brooks Concert Hall (acclaimed by performers and acoustical experts as one of the finest medium-sized performance spaces in the region); St. Joseph Memorial Chapel (built in 1924 and containing the recently renovated McCooey Chapel on the lower level); Hogan Campus Center (with bookstore, post office, coffee lounge, cafeteria and pub); Carol and Park B. Smith Hall (housing the Center for Religion, Ethics and Culture and the Rehm Library); the Multimedia Resource Center in Edith Stein Hall; and the science complex in Haberlin, O'Neil and Swords Halls.

Coeducational since 1972, Holy Cross enrolls a student body of proven accomplishment. Almost all graduated in the top 20 percent of their high school classes. Most live in 10 residence halls on campus, all fully connected to the college's computer network. Students, elected by their peers, represent their classmates at faculty meetings, on major college committees, and in a consultative capacity on the appointment and promotion of faculty. There are more than 100 co-curricular offerings



on campus and diverse opportunities for innovative academic options such as the first-year program, community-based learning, Washington semester, internships and full-year study abroad.

Holy Cross integrates faith and knowledge with an emphasis on service, in keeping with the Jesuits' commitment to educate "men and women for others." A distinguishing and all-important characteristic of education at Holy Cross is the emphasis placed upon the service of faith and the promotion of justice. The Office of the College Chaplains advises Student Programs for Urban Development (SPUD), which is the largest student organization on campus. More than 450 students are involved in 37 direct-service programs in Worcester.
