The Series With Sacred Heart

This will be only the second meeting between the Crusaders and the Pioneers on the gridiron. The schools first met on Sept. 3, 2005, with Holy Cross posting a 56-21 victory at Fitton Field. Against current members of the Northeast Conference, the Crusaders stand 3-3 with marks of 1-0 against Sacred Heart and 2-3 vs. Duquesne. Sacred Heart is 0-2 all-time against the Patriot League, falling to both Holy Cross and Lafayette.

Randolph Leads Crusader Offense

Senior **Dominic Randolph** (Amelia, Ohio) is now in his fourth season as Holy Cross' starting quarterback, and is one of the favorites to win the Walter Payton Award, presented annually to the top player in the NCAA football championship subdivision. In the season opener against Georgetown, he completed 36 of 56 passes for 414 yards and two touchdowns. Last year, Randolph threw for at least 300 yards in each of his last eight games, including three 400-yard performances. In 11 games played last season, he hit on 340 of 520 passes for 3,838 yards and 34 touchdowns. Randolph set new Holy Cross single-season records for passing yards, total offense (3,917 yards), completions and pass attempts, while tying the mark for touchdown passes in 2008. He now owns the top two spots on the single-season lists for both completions and pass attempts.

Randolph Attacks Record Book

Over the course of his collegiate career, senior quarterback **Dominic Randolph** has completed 857 of 1,357 passes for 10,093 yards and 85 scores, while amassing 10,415 yards of total offense. During the Georgetown game, he broke the Holy Cross and Patriot League records for career passing yards, while becoming the first player in school or conference history to throw for over 10,000 career yards. Last season, Randolph broke the Holy Cross career records for completions, pass attempts, touchdown passes and yards of total offense. In addition, his career completion percentage of .632 in the best in school history, while 19 career 300-yard passing games and six 400-yard passing games are both the most-ever by a Crusader. Randolph enters the Sacred Heart game ranked 19th all-time in NCAA football championship subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) history in touchdown passes, 22nd in passing yards and 23rd in total offense.

Defense Dominates Georgetown

The Holy Cross defense turned in an outstanding performance last Saturday in the 20-7 victory over Georgetown. The Crusaders allowed only seven points, seven first downs and 169 total yards on the day. After the Hoyas scored a touchdown on their opening possession, Holy Cross held Georgetown to just 104 total yards and no points over the final 55:50 of play. At one point during the second and third quarters, the Crusaders held the Hoyas without a first down for five straight possessions. The seven points, seven first downs and 169 total yards were all the fewest allowed by the Holy Cross defense since Sept. 22, 2007, when they defeated Georgetown 55-0.

Lamkin, Rodriguez Rack Up Tackles

Senior linebacker **Sean Lamkin (Jenks, Okla.)** and senior linebacker **Marcus Rodriguez (Peoria, Ariz.)** have been two of the top players on the Holy Cross defense over the last few years, and both were named second team All-Patriot League in 2008. In the season opener against Georgetown, Lamkin totaled seven tackles with his first career interception and one tackle for loss. Last year, he led the team with 71 total tackles in 11 games played, including 56 solo stops, six tackles for loss and one sack. Lamkin also broke up two passes, forced a fumble and recovered a fumble last season. Over the course of his collegiate career, Lamkin has now totaled 102 tackles with 11 tackles for loss. Rodriguez opened the 2009 campaign with a team-high eight solo tackles and two pass breakups against Georgetown. He finished 2008 ranked second on the team with 68 tackles in 11 games played, including 49 solo stops, four sacks and eight tackles for loss. Rodriguez also broke up four passes last year, forced a fumble and recovered one fumble. Over the course of his Holy Cross career, Rodriguez has now totaled 146 total tackles with 10 tackles for loss.

Experienced Wide Receivers Shine In Passing Game

Holy Cross once again has a number of outstanding weapons in the passing game, as five different wide receivers caught at least three passes against Georgetown in the season opener. Senior wide receiver **Bill Edger (Hainesport, N.J.)** led the way with seven catches for 82 yards, including a seven-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter. Junior wide out **Luke Chmielinski (Walpole, Mass.)** also had a strong day, catching seven passes for 79 yards. In addition, senior wide receiver **Nick Cole (Tucson, Ariz.)** totaled five receptions for 33 yards, junior wide out **Fredie Santana (Staten Island, N.Y.)** posted four catches for 59 yards and junior wide receiver **Rob Koster (Bellerose, N.Y.)** caught three passes for 30 yards. Overall, the Crusaders had nine different players with at least one reception against Georgetown.

Offensive Line Paves The Way For Success

Holy Cross returns four starters to an offensive line which looks to be one of the most dominating units in the Patriot League in 2009. During the season opener against Georgetown, the line lead the way for the Crusaders to amass 519 yards of total offense. The starters on the Holy Cross line are senior **Chris Smith (Buffalo, N.Y.)** at center, senior **Chris Poole (Scituate, Mass.)** and junior **Mike Bernazzani (Whitman, Mass.)** at guard, and senior **Aaron Jones (Springfield, Ohio)** and junior **Mike McCabe (Watertown, Conn.)** at tackle. All told, the offensive linemen on Holy Cross' roster have combined for 94 career starts. A year ago, Jones was named first team All-Patriot League and Poole earned second team All-Patriot League honors. During the 2008 season, the line paved the way for Holy Cross to run for 106.5 yards per game, while also providing pass protection which allowed the Crusaders to throw for 348.9 yards per contest. In addition, Holy Cross allowed only 16 sacks in 11 games last year, while attempting 523 passes (just one sack for every 33.7 times the team dropped back to pass).

Steve Silva accounted for 179 yards and six touchdowns, to lead Holy Cross to a 56-21 victory over Sacred Heart in the 2005 season opener at Fitton Field. Silva recorded 141 yards and all of his scoring in the first half, as the Crusaders scored touchdowns on seven consecutive possessions to take a 49-14 lead at the break. The Pioneers actually began the game with a quick 14-0 lead, scoring a pair of touchdowns on their opening possessions, with drives that went just 41 and 23 yards. Ed Pricolo rushed one yard for the first touchdown, then Joey Henley caught a 14-yard scoring pass from Tyler Arciaga. But the Crusaders then came to life, dominating the game for the remainder of the day. Silva tossed an eight yard touchdown pass to John O'Neil to open the Holy Cross scoring, then ran four yards for a touchdown to tie the game at 14-14. O'Neil then threw a pair of touchdown passes, of 25 yards to Silva and 77 yards to Sean Gruber, giving the Crusaders a 28-14 lead at the end of the first quarter. Silva threw another touchdown pass to O'Neil, this one going for 16 yards, before rushing for two more touchdowns prior to halftime to put Holy Cross up 49-14. Sacred Heart scored its final points on a touchdown run by Pricolo in the third quarter, then Gideon Akande concluded the scoring late in the third quarter with a 10-yard touchdown run. O'Neil finished the day having completed 15 of 21 passes for 225 yards and two scores, in addition to his two touchdown receptions. The Crusaders had 10 different players catch passes in the game, led by Bob Turkovich with four receptions for 42 yards. The Holy Cross defense was led by Dan Adams with nine tackles, while Casey Gough added five tackles, an interception and a pass breakup. Henley led Sacred Heart with 10 receptions for 125 yards and a score, while Pricolo added 21 carries for 91 yards and two touchdowns.

DiMichele & Wright Lead Secondary

Junior strong safety **Anthony DiMichele (McKees Rocks, Pa.)** and senior cornerback **Michael Wright (Fort Washington, Md.)** both played well in the season-opening victory over Georgetown. DiMichele made six solo tackles against the Hoyas, with one tackle for loss and a pass breakup. Last season, he ranked third on the team with 58 total tackles, including 53 solo stops and two tackles for loss. DiMichele also ranked second on the team with 10 pass breakups in 2008, while recording a pair of interceptions. Wright posted four solo tackles against Georgetown, in addition to breaking up two passes. In 2008, he earned second team All-Patriot League honors, after leading the team with 12 pass breakups. In addition, Wright recorded one interception and 34 total tackles a year ago, including two tackles for loss.

Bellomo, Houghton Shine At Tailback

Sophomore tailback **Matt Bellomo (Holliston, Mass.)** and freshman tailback **Eddie Houghton (Toronto, Ontario)** both had solid performances against Georgetown in the season opener. Bellomo caught six passes for 67 yards, in addition to rushing for 14 yards on seven carries. Last season, Bellomo rushed for 150 yards on 39 attempts, while catching four passes for 37 yards. Houghton led the team with 52 rushing yards on seven carries against the Hoyas, and also caught a pass for nine yards. Houghton's 52 rushing yards were the most by a Holy Cross player in his collegiate debut since Gideon Akande ran for 87 yards on eight carries against Georgetown in 2002.

Offense Puts Up Big Numbers

The Holy Cross offense opened the 2009 season by scoring 20 points and recording 519 yards of total offense in the victory over Georgetown. Last year, the Crusaders averaged 34.4 points and 455.4 total yards per game. Holy Cross also totaled 348.9 passing yards per game a year ago, the second-most in school history behind only the 1987 team which averaged 358.4 yards through the air. In addition, Holy Cross hit the 40-point mark three times last year, scoring 44 points at Dartmouth, 42 points against Massachusetts and 41 points against Brown. The Crusaders also had an outstanding year offensively in 2007, averaging 35.9 points and 463.4 yards per game.

Defending The Home Turf

Holy Cross has enjoyed great success at Fitton Field over the years. The Crusaders, who played their first game at Fitton Field in 1903, have posted an all-time home mark of 354-166-27 (.672). Fitton Field is the second-oldest stadium still used for Division I college football, behind only Franklin Field at the University of Pennsylvania (opened in 1895). Holy Cross' best decade at home occurred from 1980-1989, when the Crusaders recorded a 41-12-1 mark. In the current decade, the Crusaders have posted a record of 26-24 at home, with a 1-0 mark so far in 2009. Holy Cross has posted a winning record at home in each of the last three years, going 3-2 in 2006, 4-2 in 2007 and 4-1 in 2008.

Crusaders Among Patriot League Leaders

Several Holy Cross players rank at or near the top of the Patriot League standings in a number of statistical categories, through games of Sept. 5. Senior quarterback **Dominic Randolph** leads the league in passing yards (414.0 yards/game) and total offense (431.0 yards/game), while standing second in pass efficiency (131.0 rating). Junior kicker **Rob Dornfried (Berlin, Conn.)** ranks first in field goals (2.0 made/game), third in punting (39.0 yards/punt) and fourth in scoring (8.0 points/game), while senior wide out **Bill Edger** stands second in receptions (7.0 catches/game), fourth in receiving yards (82.0 yards/game) and fifth in scoring (6.0 points/game). In addition, junior wide receiver **Luke Chmielinski** is second in the league in receptions (7.0 catches/return); junior wide out **Freddie Santana** ranks fourth in punt returns (1.8 yards/return); freshman tailback **Eddie Houghton** stands fifth in rushing (52.0 yards/game); sophomore tailback **Matt Bellomo** is fifth in receptions (6.0 catches/game); and senior tight end **Paul Nielsen (Center Line, Mich.)** ranks fifth in scoring (6.0 points/game). As a team, Holy Cross leads the league in passing offense (414.0 yards/game), total offense (519.0 yards/game), rushing defense (38.0 yards/game), passing defense (131.0 yards/game), total defense (169.0 yards/game), scoring defense (7.0 points/game) and pass efficiency defense (78.3 rating); while standing second in pass efficiency (131.0 rating) and punt returns (6.6 yards/return); and ranking third in net punting (32.5 yards/punt).

In addition, Holy Cross senior quarterback **Dominic Randolph** was named the preseason Offensive Player of the Year, and linebacker Mark Leggiero of Lafayette was chosen as the preseason Defensive Player of the Year.

Crusaders Look To Post Another Winning Season

In 2009, the Crusaders are looking to post a winning record for the fifth straight year. In 2008, Holy Cross finished the season with an overall record of 7-4, marking the third consecutive year in which it has posted seven victories. The Crusaders previously went 7-4 in both 2006 and 2007, and their 21-12 mark over the last three seasons is its best in a three-year span since the 1990, 1991 and 1992 squads went a combined 26-6-1. Holy Cross also posted a winning record in 2005 (6-5), and has an overall mark of 27-17 since the beginning of the 2005 campaign. This marks the first time the Crusaders have posted four straight winning seasons since finishing with a winning mark in seven straight years from 1986-1992.

Head Coach Tom Gilmore

Tom Gilmore is now in his sixth season as head coach at the College of the Holy Cross. Gilmore currently owns an overall record of 31-25, including a 28-17 mark since the beginning of the 2005 campaign. He has led Holy Cross to winning records in four straight seasons, including 7-4 marks in 2006, 2007 and 2008, along with winning streaks of six games (in 2008) and five games (in 2006). Two of Gilmore's players, Dominic Randolph (2007 and 2008) and Steve Silva (2005), have been named the Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year, with Silva also earning first team All-America honors. On Oct. 8, 2005, Gilmore led the Crusaders to their first victory over a ranked team since 2000, with a 13-10 win at No. 10 Lehigh. Prior to his time at Holy Cross, Gilmore served as an assistant coach at Lehigh (2000-2003), Dartmouth (1992-1999), Pennsylvania (1986, 1990-1991) and Columbia (1987-1989). An Academic All-American at Pennsylvania, Gilmore graduated in 1986 with a bachelor's degree in computer mathematics. He was the Ivy League Player of the Year as a senior and helped lead the Quakers to four consecutive Ivy League titles.

2009 Game Captains

Senior Dominic Randolph is serving as the Crusaders' team captain during the 2009 season. Along with Randolph, Holy Cross will select a game captain for each week's contests. Here is a look at the Crusaders' game captains so far in 2009:

Randolph Named Team Captain

Senior quarterback **Dominic Randolph** is serving as Holy Cross' team captain during the 2009 football season, as announced by head coach Tom Gilmore following the conclusion of spring practice. Randolph, who was one of three captains during the 2007 campaign and one of two captains in 2008, becomes the first player in school history to serve as a team captain for three seasons. Only 10 other players in the history of Holy Cross football had previously served as a captain for two years. This will also mark the first time since the 1967 season that the Crusaders will have just one player serving as team captain.

Crusaders Bring In Preseason Honors

Several Holy Cross players earned preseason accolades heading into the 2009 campaign. Senior quarterback **Dominic Randolph** was named a second team All-American by both The Sports Network and *Phil Steele's 2009 College Football Preview*. In addition, several other players were selected preseason All-Patriot League by *Phil Steele's 2009 College Football Preview*. Randolph was joined on the first team by senior offensive lineman **Aaron Jones**, senior offensive lineman **Chris Poole**, senior linebacker **Marcus Rodriguez**, senior offensive lineman **Chris Smith** and senior defensive back **Michael Wright**. Senior defensive lineman **Alex Carson** (Atlanta, Ga.), junior defensive back **Anthony DiMichele**, junior kick returner **Josh Jenkins** and senior offensive lineman **Rob Petrosino** were all selected to the second team.

Tradition Of Excellence

The 2009 campaign marks the 114th season of Holy Cross football. The Crusaders enter this week's game with an overall record of 584-466-54, good for a .553 winning percentage. Prior to the start of the 2009 season, Holy Cross' 583 all-time victories ranked as the 15th most among all Division I-AA schools. Holy Cross has had 31 first team All-America selections, sent 69 players on to professional football, won five Lambert Cups, claimed five Patriot League championships, and was named the Division I-AA Team of the Year in 1987. The Crusaders also played in the 1946 Orange Bowl, losing to host Miami on the game's final play.

Scouting The Pioneers

Sacred Heart enters this week's game with an overall record of 0-1, following last week's 31-12 loss to Marist. Junior quarterback Dale Fink led the Pioneers by completing 30 of 44 passes for 237 yards and a touchdown with two interceptions. Senior fullback Brian Friedman added 61 rushing yards on 11 carries, while senior wide out Steve Tedesco had a team-best six receptions for 79 yards. On the defensive side of the ball, sophomore cornerback Titus McIntosh led Sacred Heart with 11 tackles, a forced fumble and a pass breakup. The Pioneers are coming off a 2008 season in which they went 8-3 overall and 4-3 in the Northeast Conference. Head coach Paul Gorham is in his sixth season at the helm of the Pioneers' program, and owns a career record of 23-31. #25 Holy Cross 20, Georgetown 7

September 5, 2009 • Worcester, Mass.

Dominic Randolph completed 36 of 56 passes for 414 yards and two touchdowns, to lead 25th-ranked Holy Cross to a 20-7 victory over Georgetown at Fitton Field. Both of Randolph's touchdown passes came in the fourth quarter, as the Crusaders rallied from a 7-6 deficit to claim the victory. The Crusader defense had an outstanding day, limiting Georgetown to just 169 total yards and seven points in the game. Sean Lamkin led the way with seven tackles, an interception and a tackle for loss. Georgetown began the game by taking the opening kickoff and marching 65 yards in 12 plays to take a 7-0 lead. Keerome Lawrence scored the touchdown on a 33-yard pass from James Brady, converting on a fourth-and-five play. But that would be all the offense the Hoyas could muster all day, as they would go on to gain just 104 more yards and never cross the Holy Cross 40-yard line again. The Crusaders began chipping away later in the first quarter with a 22-yard field goal by Rob Dornfried, which was set up when Perry Townsend blocked a punt. Neither team scored in the second quarter, then Dornfried added a 19-yard field goal midway through the third quarter to make the score 7-6. Holy Cross finally claimed its first lead of the game at the 14:21-mark of the fourth quarter, when Randolph hit Paul Nielsen with an 18-yard scoring pass. Randolph then found Bill Edger from seven yards out with 6:52 remaining to conclude the scoring. Edger finished the day with seven receptions for 82 yards, while Luke Chmielinski added seven catches for 79 yards. Eddie Houghton led the Crusader ground game with 52 yards on seven carries.

Lamkin Leads Defense Seeking A Championship

Senior Sean Lamkin was heartbroken. "That was the worst loss I've ever had," he said of the 28-27 defeat to Colgate last season that propelled the Raiders to the Patriot League championship and football championship subdivision playoffs, and sent Holy Cross to the offseason. "We could have and should have won that game."

That sentence could easily stand as the mission statement for the 2009 Crusader football season. In each of the last three years, Holy Cross has finished at least tied for second in the Patriot League. It's the team's best three-year stretch since 1990-1992, but that has served as no consolation for a program searching for its first Patriot League championship since 1991. "It's definitely a motivating factor," Lamkin said of the close calls the last three years. "The coaches don't have to bring it up."

Last year's 7-4 record stands as especially disappointing for Lamkin and company. The Crusaders lost those four contests by a total of just eight points. "We were definitely better than our record," he said. "We got a couple of bad breaks. One play changes the game."

During the rise of Holy Cross football under head coach Tom Gilmore, all eyes have been on the offense. With an unrelenting air attack, a bastion of an offensive line and a strong-armed quarterback rewriting the school record book, the offensive 11 has garnered the bulk of the attention in the program's climb toward the top of the Patriot League. While the offense receives the accolades, the defense has very quietly held its own.

Eleven Holy Cross players were named All-Patriot League in 2008, the most to be honored in 16 years. Four of those were from the defensive side of the ball, the highest number of Crusader defenders to earn all-conference honors since 2001. Lamkin anchors the defense and led the team with 71 tackles last year en route to second team All-Patriot League honors. The 6-2, 225 pound outside linebacker hails from Oklahoma, long a football hotbed.

After beginning football in sixth grade, Lamkin attended Jenks Prep, a pigskin juggernaut 20 minutes outside of Tulsa. Home to 12 Oklahoma 6A state championships, the school enjoys a reputation for sending players to large college programs, and some

graduates have moved on to the NFL. "It was a lot of fun," Lamkin said of playing at Jenks. "Playing in front of sold out crowds and playing in front of 35,000 people."

In his four years, Lamkin helped the team win the state championship in 2003 and back-to-back district titles in 2004 and 2005. A senior captain in '05, he had 126 tackles and one interception over his last two years in high school, including in an abbreviated senior season cut short by a broken collarbone. He was named All-District both seasons, despite the injury in his final year.

Before getting hurt, Lamkin had been eyeing a college career at Tulsa University or at a Big XII school. Though he returned to the field late in the season, his football future was cloudy. The opportunities to play at large programs in the Midwest began drying up.

"I started looking at Ivy League schools," Lamkin said. "My mom would send out tapes. She sent one to Holy Cross, and then I heard back. Four days later, I signed. I went from one program with a rich tradition to another."

Lamkin became a Crusader in the fall of 2006 and saw playing time as a freshman. He played in nine contests, mostly as a backup and on special teams, making two tackles during the season. It was his critical fumble recovery in the fourth quarter at Lafayette that set up the game-winning drive for Holy Cross. That season ended three weeks later with a crushing one-point loss at Colgate, a theme that has become all too familiar for the Oklahoman and his teammates.

Being thrust right into the middle of varsity action was not a difficult transition for him, although he did have to make some changes to his game. "The knowledge you have to have at the college level is the biggest adjustment," Lamkin said. "I was prepared for the speed, but you have to know what the entire defense is doing."

The gradual process from fill-in to impact player had begun. He built on his successful freshman debut with a solid sophomore season, accumulating 22 tackles, 19 of them solo, while playing in all 11 games. His best performance came against Georgetown in his only start of the season, when he made five tackles, including two for loss, and had one fumble recovery in a 55-0 win. It was a precursor to last season when Lamkin enjoyed a breakout campaign and emerged as a defensive force at outside linebacker for the Crusaders. He started all 11 games, his team-high 71 tackles were 12th best in the Patriot League, and he led the team with 55 solo stops. His biggest individual performances came in some of the most crucial games of the season, including a team-leading 13 tackle effort against Colgate and a 10 stop, two sack stat line at Lafayette.

Lamkin credits the defensive coaches and specifically coach Gilmore, himself a defensive specialist, for his development as a player. "He is a hands-on coach with the defense and the linebackers especially. It's been helpful." At this year's preseason camp, the senior worked on his game and prepared to take on a leadership role on defense. "I'm taking a lot more time learning the entire defense, making sure we're all on the same page, which is really important. I've been working on my technique in camp and critiquing how I play. Doing my job is critical to the defense."

The offense is bolstered by the return of preseason Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year Dominic Randolph at quarterback along with four starters on the line, but it's the defense that features the most experience. Nine starters return, including all four at the linebacker positions. Lamkin and fellow seniors Marcus Rodriguez, Andrew Cialino and Anthony Campbell are the nucleus of a defense that looks to improve upon last year's efforts. Holy Cross allowed 25.8 points and 367.3 yards per game in 2008. "We have a lot of other seniors at other positions coming back," Lamkin said of the team. "Marcus and I work really well together. We're proud of the offense, and we're working to get the defense its own accolades."

Asked what intangible the team needs to do in order to get over the hump, Lamkin didn't hesitate. "The team has it right now. We have to put everything we have towards the Patriot League championship. Forcing turnovers will be key." Last year the defense caused 21 turnovers, including nabbing 17 interceptions.

As Holy Cross embarks on the 2009 campaign, it finds itself in unfamiliar territory as the conference favorite for the first time in 18 years. The Crusaders received 67 points and seven first place votes, edging out Colgate in the preseason Patriot League poll. Holy Cross was also ranked 13th nationally in *Phil Steele's 2009 College Football Preview*. "We take notice but it's not really important," Lamkin said of the preseason media hype. "It's an honor to be picked in the polls so high. As a team we don't look at that. We know we have a target on our backs. We're not satisfied because we haven't won anything. We're hungry. We're not complacent at all. We've got to keep giving a little more than we have."

Regardless of how the season pans out, Lamkin's future is bright. In the wake of former teammate Brett McDermott's participation in training camp with the Indianapolis Colts this summer, Lamkin still keeps an eye on possible football in the days after Holy Cross, though he recognizes the odds are long. "Playing in the NFL is every player's wish," he said. Should his days on the gridiron end this fall in a Crusader uniform, Lamkin is prepared for what will come next. An economics major, he hopes to attend graduate school and perhaps pursue a career in finance.
